#### **LWV-PWA 2020 Annual Meeting**

#### **Suffragists Heritage Committee Report**

The LWV-PWA Suffragists Heritage Committee has completed a number of its planned programs and activities during the past year and continues with the planning for others. Unfortunately, a few have been post-poned due to the Coronavirus Pandemic that has affected all of our lives.

Beginning with the 2019 Annual Meeting, the Suffragist Turning Point Memorial Silent Auction netted a total of \$340 toward achieving the League's donation goal of \$1,000, which was fully achieved in September 2019. League members also participated in the Turning Point hosted Women's Equality Day Tour: "Rightfully Hers: American Women and the Vote."

In partnership with the Prince William Library System and the Chinn Friends of the Library, the League cohosted a successful author and book signing event: "Suffragists in Washington D.C.: The 1913 Parade and Fight for the Vote" by Rebecca Roberts, with 17 attendees. The LWV-PWA Book Group selected for review, "Votes for Women: American Suffrage and the Battle for the Ballot" and is working with the library staff to compile a list of the Suffragists movement books and designing a bookmark to be distributed to the public.

In partnership with the Prince William Historic Preservation Foundation, the League began planning and confirming arrangements for the "Honoring Women of Achievement Day: The Suffragist Movement in Prince William County" Suffragist Tea. The event will be held at the Ripon Lodge historical site. The planned agenda includes Mrs. Robert Walker enactment performance by Lynne Garvey-Hodge, character actress, a musical soiree, a poetry soiree, a wine and cheese tasting corner, a suffragists book shop, an "In Your Suffragists Bonnet Parade" with period costume welcome, and a champagne hors d' oeuvre reception. Due to the Governor's Coronavirus guidance, the Tea is postponed until spring 2021.

Currently the Committee is working on two activities: a request to the Prince William Board of County Supervisors Chair Ann Wheeler, to issue a proclamation on August 20, 2020 in honor of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary; and exploring hosting a panel round table forum, "100 Years Past Women's Suffrage" Where are the women in public life now? Where do we go next and how do we get there? Panelists: Elected Officials, Academia's, Business Owners, etc.

#### 2019 – 2020 Annual Report of the 2nd Vice President

#### **General and Special Meetings**

The LWV-PWA Kickoff meeting was on September 21, with a luncheon at City Tavern. Guest speaker was Courtney Tierney, Director of Social Services Prince William County, who spoke on Affordable Housing.

On October 6, 2019, the League had a joint program with Chinn Park Regional Library, The Suffragists in Washington, D.C. Rebecca Boggs Roberts, author of *Suffragists in Washington, D.C.: The 1913 Parade and Fight for the Vote,* discussed the first civil rights march to use the nation's capital as a backdrop; The Great Suffrage Parade of 1913. The heroic struggles of Alice Paul and the National Woman's Party and how they worked to earn the vote for women were highlighted.

On Saturday, October 26, from 10:00 until noon, members of the League discussed *Cane River*, by Lalita Tademy. They met at Jirani Coffee House, 9425 West Street, Manassas, and Judy Shelly led the discussion.

On the same day, at 1:00 p.m., Carol Proven presented, "The History and Relevancy of the LWV" for the Life Long Learning Institute, which met at Dar Al Noor.

The first meeting of 2020 was to be held on January 19 at the John Barton Payne Building in Warrenton. The program was to be a forum to educate members and the public on gun safety in the home and the community. Due to the possibility that the intent of the program would be misunderstood, the Board decided to cancel.

On February 16, the program focused on voter suppression. Karen Hughes White, a co-founder of the Afro-American Historical Association, spoke on voter suppression among African Americans. In addition, Keith Scarborough, a member of the Prince William County Electoral Board, provided a contemporary take on how voting continues to be suppressed. This meeting was at the John Barton Payne Building in Warrenton.

On March 15, the planned program topics were; the 2020 Census, libraries working with the League of Women Voters, and what the next steps were to be for the Prince William Area League. This meeting was to be held at Bull Run Library but was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

April 1' 2020, the PWA League was set to partner with the Prince William Public Library System for its Census Awareness Day at the Woodbridge campus of Northern Virginia Community College. This was to be a daylong event, where the League would register voters and hand out educational materials on voting. The event was cancelled.

The April 19 general meeting was cancelled before plans could be completed.

The book *Evicted* by Matthew Desmond, was discussed on May 5<sup>th</sup>, virtually. Miggy Strano served as the moderator.

The Annual Meeting was scheduled for May 17. It was to be a Centennial Celebration and Tea Party at the Manassas Park Community Center, but became a virtual meeting with all committee reports sent electronically.

#### April 28, 2020

#### Evicted by Matthew Desmond

In Evicted, Princeton sociologist and MacArthur "Genius" Matthew Desmond follows eight families in Milwaukee as they each struggle to keep a roof over their heads. Hailed as "wrenching and revelatory" (The Nation), "vivid and unsettling" (New York Review of Books), Evicted transforms our understanding of poverty and economic exploitation while providing fresh ideas for solving one of twenty-first-century America's most devastating problems. #### July 13, 2020

The Boy Crisis: Why Our Boys Are Struggling and What We Can Do About It, by Warren Farrell, Ph.D. and John Gray, Ph.D.

What is the boy crisis? It's a crisis of education. Worldwide, boys are 50 percent less likely than girls to meet basic proficiency in reading, math, and science. It's a crisis of mental health. ADHD is on the rise. And as boys become young men, their suicide rates go from equal to girls to six times that of young women. It's a crisis of fathering. Boys are growing up with less-involved fathers and are more likely to drop out of school, drink, do drugs, become delinquent, and end up in prison. It's a crisis of purpose. Boys' old sense of purpose—being a warrior, a leader, or a sole breadwinner—is fading. #### October 13, 2020

All the Presidents Men, by Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward

The most devastating political detective story of the century: the inside account of the two Washington Post reporters who broke the Watergate scandal.

Published just months before President Nixon's resignation, *All the President's Men* revealed the full scope of the scandal and introduced for the first time the mysterious "Deep Throat." Beginning with the story of a simple burglary at Democratic headquarters and then continuing through headline after headline, Bernstein and Woodward deliver a riveting firsthand account of their reporting. Their explosive reports won a Pulitzer Prize for *The Washington Post*, toppled the president, and have since inspired generations of reporters.

When Everything Changed: The Amazing Journey of American Women from 1960 to the Present, Gail Collins

Gail Collins, *New York Times* columnist and bestselling author, recounts the astounding revolution in women's lives over the past 50 years, with her usual "sly wit and unfussy style" (*People*). Votes for Women!: American Suffragists and the Battle for the Ballot by Winifred Conkling For nearly 150 years, American women did not have the right to vote. On August 18, 1920, they won that right, when the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified at last. To achieve that victory, some of the fiercest, most passionate women in history marched, protested, and sometimes even broke the law—for more than eight decades.

From Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, who founded the suffrage movement at the 1848 Seneca Falls Convention, to Sojourner Truth and her famous "Ain't I a Woman?" speech, to Alice Paul, arrested and force-fed in prison, this is the story of the American women's suffrage movement and the private lives that fueled its leaders' dedication. *Votes for Women!* explores suffragists' often powerful, sometimes difficult relationship with the intersecting temperance and abolition campaigns, and includes an unflinching look at some of the uglier moments in women's fight for the vote.

By turns illuminating, harrowing, and empowering, *Votes for Women!* paints a vibrant picture of the women whose tireless battle still inspires political, human rights, and social justice activism.
